# A Time of Deep Tradition



**Easter is the most important religious celebration in Greece** and one of the most meaningful moments of the year for local communities.

**In Kythira**, the island prepares for Holy Week with a sense of reverence and anticipation that can be felt in every village.

Churches and monasteries become the center of community life. Byzantine hymns echo through small chapels, homes are decorated, and preparations for the **Resurrection** begin days in advance. Families return to the island, and the rhythm of daily life shifts toward the celebration.

The island's many historic churches, scattered across villages and hillsides, create an intimate setting where traditions are preserved in their original form.

Experiencing **Holy Week** in these small communities offers a rare opportunity **to witness the living traditions that continue to shape Kythira's cultural identity.**



# Holy Friday Processions

One of the most emotional moments of Easter in Kythira takes place on Great Friday, when the **Epitaph** procession moves through villages across the island.

The Epitaph, beautifully decorated with flowers and candles, symbolizes the tomb of Christ and is carried through narrow streets, village squares, and along coastal paths. Residents follow the procession in silence while church choirs chant the traditional hymns of the day.

In coastal villages such as Avlemonas, the procession moves along the harbor, illuminated by candles and the soft light reflected from the sea.

The combination of the night atmosphere, the sea breeze, and the solemn hymns creates a uniquely powerful moment.

These processions represent centuries-old traditions that continue to unite the island's communities and reveal the deep spiritual heritage of Kythira.



# The Night of the Resurrection

Late on **Holy Saturday night**, the atmosphere across Kythira becomes one of anticipation and quiet excitement as people gather outside churches for the Resurrection service.

Shortly before midnight, the church lights are extinguished, and the **Holy Flame** is brought out by the priest. One by one, candles are lit and passed from person to person until the entire churchyard is illuminated by thousands of small lights.

At the moment the bells ring and the words “**Christos Anesti**” are proclaimed, fireworks light up the night sky and the island shifts instantly from solemn reflection to celebration.

Across villages and towns, people greet one another with the traditional Easter wishes and carry their lit candles home, marking the beginning of the festive celebration.



# Easter Sunday Celebrations and Beyond



**Easter Sunday** marks the **joyful culmination of Holy Week** and is celebrated throughout Kythira with **food, music, and gatherings that bring together families and friends.**

Across villages and coastal settlements such as Agia Pelagia, lamb is roasted slowly over open fires while tables are prepared with traditional dishes and sweets. The aromas of roasted meats, fresh herbs, and honey-based desserts fill village courtyards and squares.



Earlier in Holy Week, families prepare one of the most recognizable symbols of Greek Easter by **painting eggs red, a tradition that represents the blood of Christ and the renewal of life.**

**During the Easter meal**, family members and friends take part in the playful ritual known as **tsougrisma**, or **egg tapping**. Two people each hold a red egg and tap them together, trying to crack the other's shell. **The person whose egg remains unbroken is believed to have good luck for the year.**



The celebrations continue into **Easter Monday**, when **the icon of Christ is carried in procession through the village of Avlemonas**, blessing the sea and the community.

**These moments of shared celebration capture the warmth and hospitality that define life on Kythira.**
